

GOING ON EXCURSIONS

- Comfortable shoes are always recommended.

VISITING BEACHES

- Sunbeds with umbrella come at extra charge. Sometimes this charge is waived if you order a snack or a beverage from the snack bar.
- Depending on the direction of the winds (Meltemi) blowing in the summertime in Greece, some beaches are more favored than others. The Concierge will be happy to assist you in making the best choice.

VISITING MUSEUMS & ARCHAEOLOGICAL SITES

- EU senior citizens 65+ are entitled to reduced rates of single tickets upon presentation of their ID card or passport for verification of their age and country of origin.
- Their operation may be suspended due to restoration works on holidays or for any other reason without previous notice. It is advisable to consult with the oncierge before your visit.

VISITING MONASTERIES

• Appropriate clothing for everyone is required otherwise entry may not be allowed. Gentlemen should avoid sleeveless clothing and shorts above the knee whereas ladies are advised to wear skirts below the knee or even a long skirt-like shawl around their waist. Their shoulders should also be covered. Usually skirts and shawls are available to use free of charge at the entrance of the Monasteries.

VISITING MOUNTAIN VILLAGES & PEAKS

- Depending on the season and the time of the day, the temperature may drop significantly at higher altitudes especially in the evenings. Therefore, carrying a jacket is recommended for your comfort.
- Weather conditions such as humidity, clouds and haze may reduce the visibility and obstruct the views.

DRIVING IN PROVINCIAL & MOUNTAIN ROADS

• Some extra care is required since goats, hares or other animals may catch you by surprise and suddenly appear in front of you in the middle of the road.

GLYFADA BEACH

This sandy beach offers shallow waters and a range of amenities, including sunbeds, umbrellas, water sports, and beachside tavernas, making it perfect for families with children.






